A quest for dynamic Liberalism

It's easy to despair about politics, but there is one political creed that is intrinsically optimistic, because it believes in the best of people - and that's Liberalism.

Our challenge now is to ensure Liberalism offers the vital missing ingredients in British politics: a sense of kindness and optimism, and reasoned hope that there is a better way - and that politics can deliver it.

If we hide our light under a bushel in the 2029 general election, we will get overlooked. Voters will be disgruntled with the two traditional governing parties, and Reform will look to cash

But people don't really want Reform – they just have a sense that there's nothing better on offer. So if we can offer a policy platform that addresses voters' circumstances and concerns, while being imaginative about how much better life could be, we could be the ones to cash in.

But we need to fly Liberalism's flag not just in our target seats but publicly and enthusiastically, so our votes make a difference - even where we don't win – in depriving Reform of greater clout.
